This past spring of 2016, IVROP held several skills competitions for high school students throughout the Imperial Valley. These competitions are not your ordinary high school sporting events. The skills competitions showcase the best career and technical education students in the region. IVROP skills competitions include: law enforcement. culinary arts, welding and agriculture, health care, and computer technology.

Inez Estrada is an IVROP Nursing and Medical Terminology Instructor at Brawley Union High School. Estrada stated, "the nursing competition is highly competitive and offers realistic activities." Estrada commented on the rigor of the competition, "this local competition prepares students for the State competition, and exposes students that will not be going on to state to a variety of excellent health related workshops."

IVROP supports the provision of career technical education (CTE) classes throughout all seven comprehensive high schools in the Imperial County, and the Imperial County Office of Education's Alternative Education Department. CTE classes are designed to help prepare high school students postsecondary career pathways through technical occupational and training.



Mr. Alex Jaime, a long time CTE instructor at Calexico High. Jaime welcomed parents and students, and introduced several other Calexico and Imperial Valley adminis-

trators responsible for CTE services at the school. During his opening remarks, Jaime reminded the audience about the importance of career and technical education skills, and how students who partake in his technology class, or in Mrs. Galindo's health pathway classes receive career and job readiness skills along with industry recognized credentials that prepare them for work after high school. Another great benefit is that some of the IVROP/CTE classes offer students industry recognized credentials or certifications. Students are able to explore a wide range of careers while they are in high school, and if they choose, can pursue additional career training, or can pursue additional college and university training for their chosen career field after high school.

High School career and technical education teachers prepare students for the competitions throughout the school year. As an example, Cory Van Driessche's Legal Service and Law Enforcement class at Central Union High School won this year's IVROP Law Enforcement Skills Competition. "I took time out of my regular curriculum to teach the basics for the skills competition. We focused on the 10


and 11 codes, penal codes, and the physical fitness requirements for entry level police officers," stated Van Driessche. This was the first year for Law Enforcement Skills. When asked about the competition Van Driessche said, "students realized the importance of not only being in good physical condition but also having the knowledge about the law."

The skills competition is an added activity offered to students to help sharpen and test their work skills. Jackie Valadez teaches Medical Terminology and Medical Assistant classes at Southwest High. Valadez stated, "the skills competition provides students with the opportunity to showcase their knowledge acquired during their health science related courses."

Here is their story written by the youngest sibling, Ariel Lopez:

"There has always been something in us that's made us stick together. When we were placed into foster care, the separation of being in different group homes took a toll on all four of us. My sisters and I were pulled into the same foster home, but Josh was

sent to another foster home in another city. We were lucky enough to have an aunt who took all four of us into her home without hesitation. Moving forward our aunt was the base for our foundation, but in each of our lives we had different people that also believed in us and kept pushing for us to continue to develop into the people we are now.

Bailey was clearly the trailblazer for the rest of us. Once she graduated from high school she began to take courses that would then lead her to become a Licensed Practical Nurse. Her journey wasn't easy as she always put us three younger siblings first to make sure we went on to college; she even moved to another city just so that the rest of us didn't have to switch high schools.

Cindol realized education was important during middle school with the help of her counselor, but it was the mentors she was able to gain through programs like ACE and IVROP that gave her the final push

she needed. Two weeks before classes at SDSU started, our old ACE case manager drove Cindol to register for classes. It was that effort that let Cindol think that if someone believed in her ability, then she should also believe in herself, so she stuck through SDSU and received her Bachelor's of Arts Degree.

Josh always knew school was important and he found support in his football family. In fact, he moved out of state to continue pursuing his football dream and education, earning his Bachelor's Degree in Applied Psychology. Josh returned to

"I have been a Project STAR Participant since 2010. I was homeless depressed, and with anxiety. It has been the best support group I've ever had. It has given me back the will to live!

Project STAR has provided me with life skills, self-esteem, employment training, photography, art, computer, dancing, cooking, and guitar workshops. It also provided activities such as karaoke, bowling, watching movies, and trips to Sea world, San Diego Zoo, Mission beach, museums, and other fun places. Thanks to these workshops and activities, I have learned or enhance many of my skills. They have also given me the opportunity to socialize with others. Project STAR has also given me recognitions, rewards, and certificates. It has also allowed me to participate in the Community Involvement Committee (CIC). Without Project STAR I would be at home depressed, and I'd probably end up going back to the streets and to drugs. Also, in my case

I wouldn't have learned how to play the guitar—something I love to do. Playing the guitar helps me release my anxiety, and it gives me a good feeling.

My story is a success story because I'm alive, but not only that; I have learned how to play the guitar and enjoy the many good things that life offers me, too. Now I'm a happy camper. He has come full circle by providing the same family atmosphere and encouragement he experienced to the high school students he works with.

I realized school was important when I knew it could be my way out of the craziness that had happened in our lives. Even going through the foster care system, I knew I owed it to myself and to my siblings who had always looked over me to continue to better my future. Believing in myself helped me get through UC Davis with a Bachelor's of Arts.

We all benefited from family and community support, whether through sports, school counselors, ACE and IVROP. Yes, we had to become adults at a faster pace than we would have liked due to our experiences. However, with each other's support and those mentors along the way we've been able to push through it all.









IVROP's Newest Project—Project RISE

Developmental Assets are the positive values, positive relationships and experiences which help bring out the best in children and teenagers. They are the building blocks of healthy, development which are essential for youth's successful RELATIONSHIPS INSPIRE SUCCESS & EXCELLENCE growth. Research by the Search Institute has identified 40 concrete, positive experiences and qualities, called Developmental Assets, which have considerable influence on young people's lives. The assets are grouped into eight categories: Support, Empowerment, Boundaries and Expectations, Constructive Use of Time, Commitment to Learning, Positive Values, Social Competencies, and Positive Identity.

> Data collected from Search Institute surveys of over 4 million youth from all backgrounds and situations have continually shown that the more Developmental Assets youth gain, the better their chances of succeeding in school and becoming happy, contributing members of their community.

> IVROP-Project RISE's goal is to build and work with community networks to use Developmental Assets findings as a foundation for measuring and monitoring skills and resources that initiate efforts to improve youth's readiness for life after high school. Collaboration among community networks can result in the following outcomes:

- Activate schools, social services, health care organizations, as well as businesses in the Imperial County in order to create an asset building culture that will contribute to the educational development of young people.
- Invigorate existing IVROP Family Development and Stabilization programs by expanding and enhancing them to become more Developmental Assets rich.
- Influence civic decision by working with decision makers and opinion leaders to leverage financial, media, and policy resources in support of this positive transformation of the Imperial County.
